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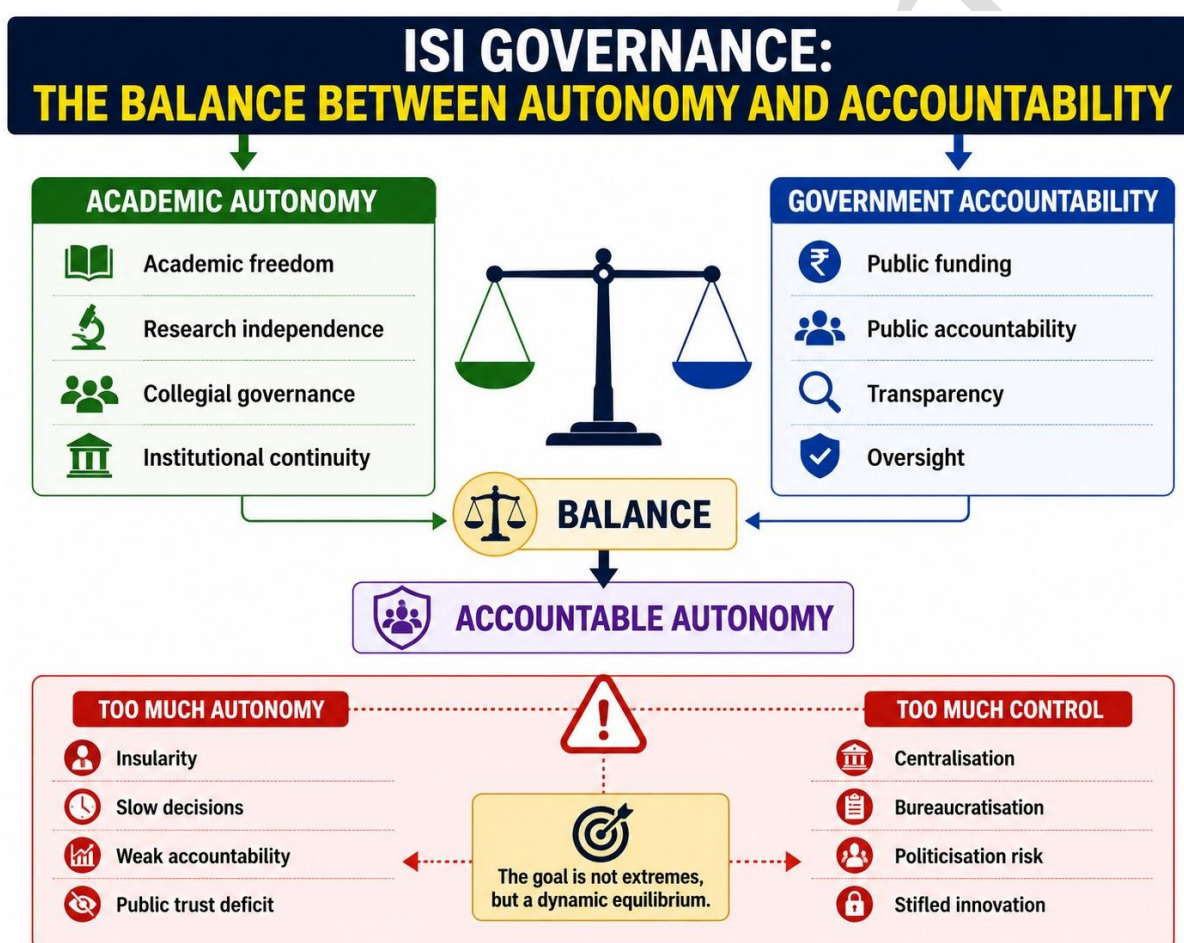

1. Indian Statistical Institute Bill, 2026: Reform versus Institutional Autonomy

a. Introduction

The Indian Statistical Institute (ISI) Bill, 2026 has been introduced in the Lok Sabha to overhaul the governance structure of the premier institution. While the government argues that it will modernise governance and improve decision-making, faculty and students fear greater executive control and erosion of institutional autonomy.

ISI was founded by P.C. Mahalanobis in 1931 and declared an Institution of National Importance in 1959. It currently operates as a registered society, despite receiving Central funding and being subject to public accountability mechanisms. The issue reflects the broader challenge of balancing autonomy, accountability and administrative efficiency in publicly funded academic institutions.



b. What Does the Bill Change?

Existing framework

The President of India would become the Visitor, with powers including ordering inquiries and reviews and removing the Director under specified circumstances.

c. Rationale Behind the Reform

- **Administrative efficiency:** The government argues that the existing 33-member Council, extensive internal representation and numerous elected members can impede timely decision-making.
- **Governance modernisation:** The proposed structure seeks greater similarity with governance frameworks of other Institutions of National Importance such as the IITs and IIMs.
- **Clearer accountability:** A statutory corporate structure can provide clearer allocation of responsibilities and improve administrative oversight.

Thus, the reform addresses a genuine governance question: Can institutional structures designed decades ago remain optimal for increasingly complex research organisations?

d. Why Has the Bill Attracted Criticism?**Institutional autonomy versus government accountability**

Critics argue that the composition of the proposed Board gives the Union government considerable influence through its representatives and nominated members.

Similarly, the government's role in constituting the search-cum-selection committee for the Director raises concerns about executive influence over academic leadership.

The fundamental tension is:

Public funding → Democratic accountability

versus

Academic freedom → Institutional autonomy

Neither complete governmental control nor complete insulation from accountability offers an optimal governance model.

Academic governance may become subordinate

The proposed Academic Council makes recommendations to the Board, while important administrative, appointment and regulatory powers rest with the Board.

Excessive separation between those possessing academic expertise and those exercising decision-making authority can weaken collegial governance in research institutions.

Risk of centralisation

Greater government involvement in appointments and periodic review of institutional leadership can improve accountability, but inadequate safeguards may create perceptions of politicisation or bureaucratisation.

Academic institutions require continuity, intellectual independence and freedom to pursue research that may not necessarily correspond with immediate governmental priorities.

Consultation deficit

Faculty, researchers and students have argued that reform should follow wider stakeholder consultation. For institutions dependent heavily on their intellectual communities, procedural legitimacy is itself an important component of successful institutional reform.

Larger Governance Lesson

ISI illustrates a recurring dilemma in higher-education governance:

Too much internal control

→ insularity + slow decisions + weak external accountability

Too much executive control

→ centralisation + bureaucratisation + potential erosion of academic freedom

Therefore, the objective should be accountable autonomy, rather than choosing between complete autonomy and governmental control.

e. Way Forward

- Ensure a balanced Board composition, including independent scientists, academics, alumni and internal representatives alongside government nominees.
- Create a transparent and independent search-cum-selection mechanism for institutional leadership.
- Clearly protect the Academic Council's authority over core academic and research matters.
- Establish objective criteria and due process for review or removal of the Director.
- Undertake structured consultation with faculty, researchers, students and other stakeholders before finalising the governance architecture.
- Measure reforms against institutional outcomes—research excellence, academic freedom, efficiency and accountability—rather than administrative uniformity alone.

Conclusion:

Reforming ISI's governance may be necessary, but institutional modernisation should not equate to administrative centralisation. For knowledge institutions, the appropriate model is “accountable autonomy” — public accountability combined with sufficient academic and operational independence to preserve excellence, innovation and intellectual freedom.
