1. An Alternative Framework to the VBSA Bill: Reimagining Higher Education Governance in India

a. Introduction

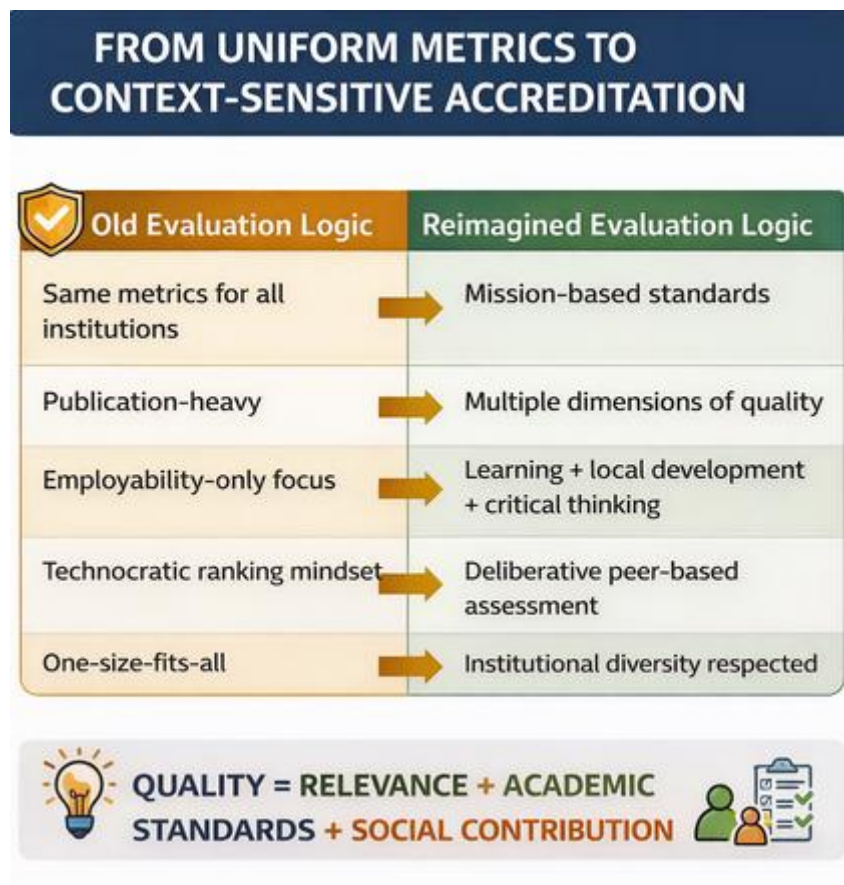
