## GS Paper II: Current Affairs

### 1. Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights) Amendment Bill, 2026

#### a. Introduction

The proposed amendment to the Transgender Persons Act has reopened a fundamental constitutional debate in India: whether gender identity is a matter of personal autonomy or state certification. While the government presents the Bill as an effort to streamline welfare and prevent misuse, it raises serious concerns regarding dignity, equality, and the spirit of the Supreme Court's landmark NALSA judgment.

The issue, therefore, goes beyond legal reform—it touches upon how the State understands and recognises individual identity in a constitutional democracy.

#### b. Evolution of Transgender Rights in India

##### NALSA Judgment (2014)

- Recognised transgender persons as a "third gender".
- Affirmed that gender identity is part of personal liberty under Article 21.
- Established the principle of self-identification of gender without medical or bureaucratic validation.

##### Transgender Persons Act, 2019

- Provided legislative backing to transgender rights.
- Introduced anti-discrimination provisions and welfare measures.
- However, faced criticism for procedural barriers in identity certification.

##### Shift in 2026 Amendment

- Marks a transition from recognition to regulation.

- Expands the role of the State in determining identity.

Thus, while earlier developments focused on recognising rights, the 2026 amendment introduces structural changes that redefine how these rights are operationalised.

### **c. Key Changes Introduced by the Amendment**

#### **i. Changes in Definition of Transgender Persons**

##### **Removal of Self-Perceived Identity**

- Deletes explicit recognition of self-identification.
- Moves away from NALSA's core principle.

##### **Narrowed Definition**

- Includes only biological, congenital, or socio-cultural identities e.g., hijra, intersex.
- Excludes non-binary, gender-fluid, and self-identifying individuals.

#### **ii. Changes in Certification Process**

##### **Multi-layered Verification System**

- Mandatory scrutiny by a medical board.
- Final approval by the District Magistrate.
- Replaces earlier affidavit-based system.

##### **Increased Bureaucratic Control**

- Introduces discretion and delays.
- Shifts authority from individual to institutions.

#### **iii. Mandatory Medical Intervention**

##### **Requirement of Sex Reassignment Surgery (SRS)**

- Made compulsory for revised gender certificate.
- Contradicts earlier non-medical approach.

##### **Implications**

- Links identity with medical procedures.
- Excludes those unwilling or unable to undergo surgery.

These changes collectively indicate a deeper conceptual shift—from identity as a personal right to identity as a regulated category—bringing us to the core philosophical issue.

### **d. Conceptual Core: Self-Perceived Gender Identity**

#### **i. Meaning of Self-Perceived Identity**

##### **Internal Sense of Gender**

- Based on personal experience and psychological identity.
- Independent of biological sex.

##### **Recognition in NALSA Judgment**

- Treated as an essential part of dignity and autonomy.

- Linked to fundamental rights under Articles 14, 19, and 21.

## **ii. Shift in the Amendment**

### **From Autonomy to External Validation**

- Identity must now be certified by authorities.
- Reduces individual agency.

### **Administrative Classification of Gender**

- Treats gender as a category to be verified.
- Moves towards a biological-institutional framework.

While this shift raises concerns, the government justifies it from a governance perspective, which needs to be understood for a balanced analysis.

## **e. Significance of the Bill: Government Perspective**

### **Defined Beneficiary Groups**

- Narrow definition ensures targeted welfare delivery.
- Reduces ambiguity in identification.

### **Verification Mechanisms**

- Medical board acts as a screening body.
- Prevents fraudulent claims of benefits.

### **Enhanced Enforcement**

- Clear definitions aid legal implementation.
- Strengthened penalties aim to improve protection.

### **Focus on Efficiency**

- Emphasis on accountability and verification.
- Aligns with administrative logic of regulation.

However, when viewed through a constitutional and social lens, several critical concerns emerge that challenge this governance-centric approach.

## **f. Critical Concerns: Constitutional and Social Implications**

### **Violation of Personal Autonomy**

- Identity becomes subject to state approval.
- Undermines dignity under Article 21.

### **Contradiction with NALSA Judgment**

- Rejects self-identification principle.
- Creates tension between legislature and judiciary.

### **Treating Identity as a Medical Issue**

- Mandatory certification by medical board.
- Pathologises gender identity.

### **Exclusionary Effects**

- Many cannot access or afford medical procedures.
- Violates inclusivity principles.

#### **Narrow Scope of Recognition**

- Excludes non-binary and gender-fluid persons.
- Creates hierarchy within transgender community.

#### **Procedural Complexity**

- Multiple authorities increase delays.
- Scope for harassment and discretion.

#### **Limited Community Consultation**

- Policies not grounded in lived experiences.
- Weakens legitimacy of reform.

These concerns become sharper when compared with global practices, where a different trend is clearly visible.

### **g. Global Perspective: Diverging from Emerging Trends**

#### **Progressive Global Practices**

- Countries like Argentina allow gender change without medical proof.
- Emphasise autonomy and dignity.

#### **Increased State Control**

- Greater reliance on medical and bureaucratic validation.
- Moves away from global rights-based framework.

Given this divergence, the need arises to design a balanced path that harmonises governance needs with constitutional values.

### **h. Way Forward: Balancing Governance and Dignity**

#### **Restore Self-Identification Principle**

- Reaffirm autonomy as per NALSA.
- Protect dignity and freedom.

#### **Design Non-Intrusive Safeguards**

- Transparent procedures without excessive verification.
- Grievance redressal systems to prevent misuse.

#### **Ensure Inclusive Policy Design**

- Engage transgender groups in policymaking.
- Reflect lived realities in law.

#### **Targeting Without Exclusion**

- Use socio-economic indicators instead of identity restrictions.
- Ensure accessibility in rural and marginalised areas.

Ultimately, the success of any reform lies in its ability to uphold constitutional morality while addressing administrative concerns.

The Transgender Persons Amendment Bill, 2026 represents a critical turning point in India's rights discourse. It reflects a shift from recognition to regulation, raising fundamental questions about the role of the State in defining identity.
